6. REPORTS / DISCUSSION

A. California Recycling Requirements and SB 1383: Short-lived Climate Pollutants Update

Kyle Rodriguez, WRCOG Senior Analyst, reported that the California Office of Administrative Law approved regulatory action on SB 1383 which is set to go into effect on January 1, 2022. CalRecycle, in coordination with HF&F Consultants, developed four model tools to assist agencies with implementation. These tools include Franchise Agreement and Exhibits, Mandatory Organic Waste

Disposal Reduction Ordinance, Procurement Policy, and Edible Food Recovery Agreement. To assist Committee members, WRCOG's Environmental Department received a Round 5 Fellow to assist with SB 1383 implementation.

B. Food Waste Prevention and Rescue Grant Program - Cycle 4 Update

Mei Wu, WRCOG Fellow, reported that applications were released in October 2020 and submitted on November 20, 2020. WRCOG will use the Grant to establish a regional food recovery network and provide food waste education and outreach to residents and businesses. The proposed food recovery program is a rescue project that is composed of three main components: needs assessment, an online Food Pantry Directory, and an online Match Application.

C. Recyclist Program Tracker

Linnea Whitney, Business Development Manager with Recyclist, presented on the cloud-based solution for solid waste and recycling management. This program tracker is designed to help manage municipal waste data and track compliance and outreach to commercial businesses' and multi-family complexes.

The purpose of this item is to provide an update on the annual Residential and Commercial Rate Survey that WRCOG conducts on behalf of the Solid Waste Committee.

Background

Each year, WRCOG conducts an informational waste rate survey of surrounding member agencies regarding fees and programs from local waste haulers. The Survey is comprised of the residential and commercial waste fees for refuse, recycling, and organics recycling within Riverside County, as well as unincorporated areas. Member agencies may use the Survey as a resource to compare with neighboring jurisdictions to understand the local rates and additional services provided by waste haulers. A draft Survey was emailed to Solid Waste Committee members in February 2021.

The purpose of this item is to provide an update on the application of the Food Waste Prevention and Rescue Grant Program - Cycle 4 that WRCOG staff will use to assist member agencies in reaching California recycling mandates.

Requested Action:

Background

The California Department of Resource Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) administers the Food Waste Prevention and Rescue Grant Program to lower overall greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by establishing new, or expanding existing, food waste prevention projects (source reduction or food rescue) in California to reduce the amount of food being disposed of in landfills.

Food Waste Prevention and Rescue Grant

In December 2020, WRCOG applied for grant funds to assist member agencies in meeting the requirements of Senate Bill 1383: Short-lived Climate Pollutants,. WRCOG will use the grant to establish a regional food recovery network and provide food waste education and outreach to residents and businesses. The grant funds will be used for the following initiatives:

Outreach and Education: Staff will tailor outreach and education to target populations, such as underserved communities that experience food insecurity, food generators / donors, and potential partners who can support food waste prevention efforts in assessing the appropriate level and type of service / strategy to pursue in different settings.

Food Pantry Directory: A web-embedded mapping tool will be developed that will allow residents to locate food pantries near them. A list of food recovery organizations will be developed and maintained. The map will provide basic information of each site, including links to its website, the location and hours, and any requirements.

Online Match Application: An online application will use matching logic technology to connect businesses that have a food surplus with organizations that recover and distribute food to those in need.

Staff collaborated with ChowMatch and the Riverside County Environmental Health Department to identify potential food generators to extrapolate an estimation of GHG emission reductions the project will result in. ChowMatch reviewed WRCOG's proposed project characteristics (types of food rescued, number of existing generators, and participating member agencies in the subregion, population, number of paid staff, partners,

and volunteers) and estimated a total of 800,000 pounds, or 400 tons, of food will be rescued from landfills in the first two years of implementation: 222,000 pounds in year one, and 580,000 pounds in year two.

WRCOG and the City of Riverside's Food Waste Prevention and Food Rescue initiative met to discuss challenges, best practices, and resources available for food recovery from a previously awarded grant in Cycle 3. WRCOG seeks to expand the City's efforts and advance food rescue and food waste prevention throughout the subregion.

Staff is discussing collaboration with Door Dash to utilize "Project Dash," a platform to transport food for donations. Door Dash provided WRCOG with a letter of support for the application and will continue collaboration if the grant is approved.

The purpose of this item is to provide an opportunity for representatives from CalRecycle to present on compliance requirements for AB 341, AB 1826, AB 827, and SB 1383.

Requested Action:

This item is reserved for a presentation by the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) on compliance updates for AB 341 (Mandatory Commercial Recycling), AB 1826 (Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling), and SB 1383 (Short-Lived Climate Pollutants (SLCP): Organic Waste Methane Emissions Reductions).

SB 1383 targeted a 50% reduction in landfilled organic waste by 2020. By 2025, that reduction target is 75%. Each jurisdiction must rescue edible food for people to eat, diverting at least 20% of currently disposed surplus food by 2025.

Prior Action:

August 19, 2020: The Solid Waste Committee directed staff to work with CalRecycle on clarification of data and reporting for edible food recovery.

The purpose of this item is to provide a status and timeline of implementation for SB 1383 and a potential delay on mandates due to COVID-19.

Requested Action:

1. Discuss and provide direction.

Background

WRCOG's Solid Waste Committee (SWC) was formed after the adoption of AB 939, "*The Integrated Waste Management Act*," to regionally address the waste diversion goals in Western Riverside County. California has continued to pass legislation (AB 341, AB 1826, AB 827, and SB 1383) requiring jurisdictions to implement processes that promote business and multi-family complex recycling and organics recycling programs. The SWC works with WRCOG's member agencies, its partners, and CalRecycle, meeting quarterly to discuss solid waste issues and ways to address mandates.

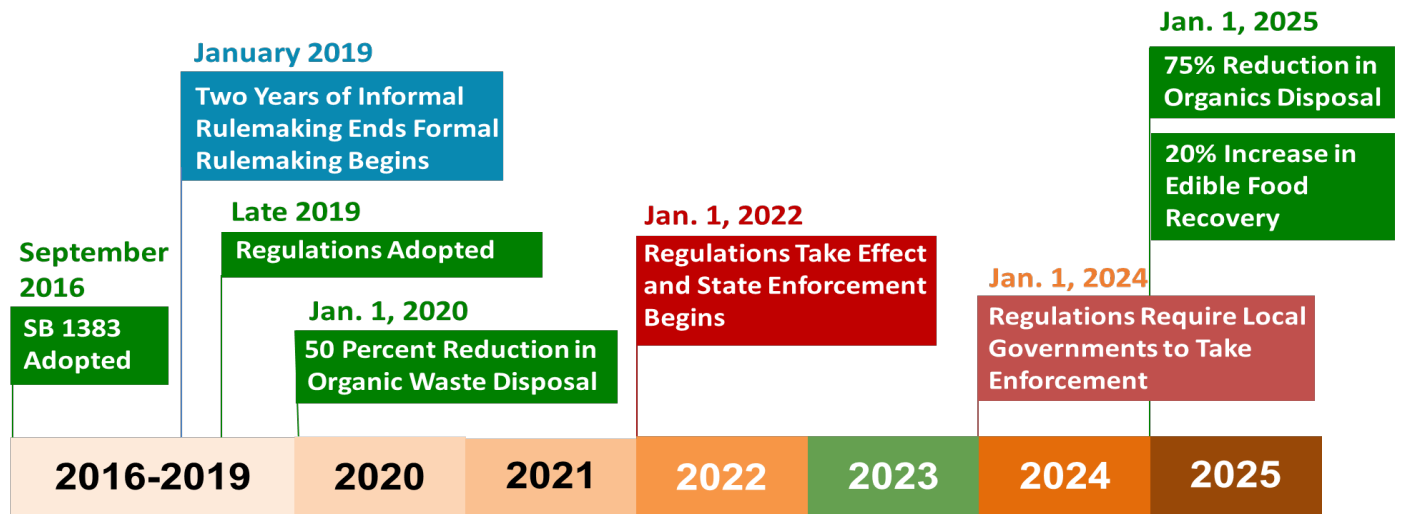
SB 1383 Implementation

SB 1383: Short-lived Climate Pollutants, establishes methane emissions reduction targets in a statewide effort to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants in various sectors of California's economy. This legislation establishes targets to achieve a 50% reduction in the level of the statewide disposal of organic waste, based on 2014 levels, by the year 2020, and a 75% reduction by the year 2025. SB 1383 also establishes an additional target by the year 2025 for edible food disposed of, requiring less than 20% to be recovered for human consumption. The law places CalRecycle as the agency authorized to establish and enforce targets required to achieve the waste disposal reduction goals.

CalRecycle has published resources with education and outreach tools which can be accessed at <https://www.calrecycle.ca.gov/organics/slcp/education>. Requirements of SB 1383 include outreach on organics recycling to all residents, businesses (those that generate edible food that can be donated), local food banks, recovery organizations, solid waste facilities, and haulers. Resources published are available in non-English languages so all residents and businesses can effectively participate in organics collection services.

By July 1, 2020, businesses must have provided recycling and organics recycling containers at business-front-of-house to collect generated waste from purchased and consumed products on the premises. Containers must be placed adjacent to trash containers and be visible, easily accessible, and marked.

Proposed Extension

Staff has held discussions with Cal Cities (the California League of Cities) and local waste haulers on potential efforts to delay the implementation of SB 1383 due to COVID-19. Projects that will reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions are a priority for WRCOG and Cal Cities; however, with housing evictions currently under a federal moratorium, utility delinquencies on the rise, and businesses using reserve funds to stay operational, raising the rates for organic recycling could economically burden the region. Staff is requesting this Committee discuss the delay of implementing SB 1383 and provide input. Should the SWC support a delay, staff will prepare a letter of support for distribution.

The purpose of this item is to provide information on the Pollution Prevention Initiative.

Requested Action:

Background

The Pollution Prevention Initiative was brought to WRCOG as a collaboration effort from the Riverside County Flood Control & Water Conservation District. The Initiative will support marketing and awareness on illegal disposal and littering, using online platforms. Program goals include quantifiable results tracking litter removal, increased pollution prevention, meeting objectives with the MS4 Permits, and complying with California mandates related to solid waste, recycling, and household hazardous waste, which aligns with WRCOG's Energy & Environmental Programs. Riverside County Flood Control & Water Conservation District approached WRCOG on program details, outlining a timeline, and tasks listed below.

Pollution Prevention Initiative

This Initiative will encourage cleanup efforts in the subregion that will bring a sense of community and responsibility to keep neighborhoods clean and beautiful. Online methods will be developed for quantifiable waste diversion tonnages after cleanups which will be used for reporting in the future. WRCOG and Riverside County Flood Control will conduct informational meetings with member agencies to encourage participation and support for this Program. Seeing the results of this Initiative firsthand will help create interest and further involvement in the reduction of litter and pollutants to protect the environment.

To track the success of the Initiative, a webpage will be developed that provides a sign-up, reporting form, and mapping tool to highlight communities that have participated in the project. Staff will document how much trash was removed from each community and use it for AB 939 reporting. Committee members will be invited to promote cleanup activities to target areas and key issues, such as schools and other voluntary community groups. Tasks include program fees, outreach, monitoring, and marketing development with expected costs of up to \$32,000. A detailed breakout is provided as an attachment for this Staff Report.
