The meeting of the WRCOG Solid Waste Committee (Committee) was called to order at 1:05 p.m. by Vice-Chairman Izzy Murguia, at the City of Moreno Valley, Riverside County Department of Waste Resources.

5. REPORTS/DISCUSSIONS

A. California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) Update

Keir Furey and Frances Bean provided an update to the Committee via phone. Mr. Furey stated that CalRecycle offers a local assistance group that meets with cities to see how they are doing on their 50% diversion goals. CalRecycle is currently in the fourth year of this four-year cycle. Mr. Furey said the main focus of CalRecycle this year is AB 341 and AB 1826, which enforces mandatory commercial recycling and mandatory organics recycling. Mr. Furey will also be in contact with cities regarding AB 341 and AB 1826 to ensure Cities are making plans to meet the new regulations; however, he is not necessarily expecting to see results yet. Mr. Furey mentioned there is Cap and Trade grant funding available which is offered to assist with organics infrastructure.

Mr. Bean reported that there are also greenhouse gas grants available, which CR&R Environmental Services was a recipient of for the Anaerobic Digester. Mr. Bean concluded by stating CalRecycle is in the process of site visits to each jurisdiction, and that WRCOG is welcome to participate in any of them.

B. Waste Hauler Update

Nicole Moore provided details for the tour of their Anaerobic Digester, provided updates regarding program implementation, disposal issues, contract updates, etc. Ms. Moore mentioned the focus on residential collection. It was noted that most CR&R contracted jurisdictions have residential fees in place and that organics collection could start as soon as July, 2016. Commercial rates are still under review by CR&R and that level of rate and collection of materials is still pending.

C. University of California, Riverside Campus Sustainability Program

Fortino Morales III provided a PowerPoint presentation regarding the Campus Sustainability Program. Mr. Morales, as the R'Garden (Community Garden) Coordinator at the University of California, Riverside (UCR) is responsible for coordination of a 3-acre experimental agricultural educational space jointly under Agricultural Operations and the Office of Sustainability. The Office of Sustainability serves as a central, non-partisan entity to facilitate and promote sustainability at UCR. It is responsible for guidance in implementing UC Sustainability Policies, reporting greenhouse gas inventories, and communicating best practices to students, faculty, and staff. Sustainability is an urgent eco-socio-economic practice that restores the financial natural capital of the planet. The Program enables people to develop the knowledge, values and skills to participate in decisions that will improve the quality of life now without damaging the planet for the future. The Sustainable Practices Policy ("Policy") establishes goals in nine areas of sustainable practices: green building, clean energy, transportation, climate protection, sustainable operations, waste reduction and recycling, environmentally preferable purchasing, sustainable food service, and sustainable water systems. UC Riverside has 100% diversion with waste to energy 'credits'.

D. General Review AB 939 and Electronic Annual Reports

Frances Bean provided a synopsis of the history of recycling in California. Mr. Bean discussed how AB 939 requirements have shaped today's mandates that include regulations on air quality, water and solid waste. Mr. Bean offered that the today's focus on AB 1826 Chesbro (Chapter 727 Statutes of 2014) requiring business to recycle their organic waste is a good example of that. Studies have shown that excess methane released from landfills can be lessened by eliminating green waste and organic waste from area landfills. In addition, Mr. Bean encouraged members to work with WRCOG staff in completing the required Electronic Annual Reports. The EAR due date for all jurisdictions is August 3, 2016.

Dolores Sanchez Badillo reminded Committee members that the Electronic Annual Reports would require the attention of all jurisdictions whether WRCOG staff was managing their required reporting or not. The CalRecycle data entry site can begin to be accessed on June 15, 2016. An Electronic Annual Report webinar is scheduled for June 16, 2016. Anyone interested should register in advance on the CalRecycle website.

WRCOG's Solid Waste Program assists member jurisdictions with addressing state mandates, specifically from Assembly Bill AB 939 (Chaptered in 1989), which required 25% and 50% diversion of waste from landfills by 1995 and 2000, respectively. While certain aspects of AB 939 have been modified over the years with legislation defining what materials counted towards diversion and how to calculate the diversion rate for jurisdictions, the intent of the bill remains. The Solid Waste Program also has a Regional Used Oil component which is designed to assist member jurisdictions in educating and promoting proper recycling and disposal of used oil, oil filters, and household hazardous waste (HHW) to the community.

Used Oil and Oil Filter Recycling Program Activities Update

CalRecycle is in the process of releasing funding notices to jurisdictions regarding the Used Oil Payment Program (OPP) 7 funding. For the past twenty years, WRCOG has administered the Used Oil and Filter and HHW Regional Programs on behalf of requesting member jurisdictions. Currently, the Cities of Banning, Calimesa, Canyon Lake, Eastvale, Hemet, Jurupa Valley, Lake Elsinore, Murrieta, Norco, San Jacinto, Temecula, and Wildomar are participating in the Program.

Some of the programs that WRCOG provides under this funding include:

- Participating in large venue and local community events annually where information and promotional giveaways are provided to the public.
- Developing regional media campaigns that include television, radio, and printed advertising in English and Spanish.
- Distributing used oil drain containers to those who change their own oil, providing them with an easier and cleaner way to recycle used motor oil.
- Distributing promotional materials bearing the recycling message "Recycle Used Motor Oil" and WRCOG's 800 hotline (1-800-350-40IL). Some of these promotional items include funnels, shop rags, creeper mats, and brochures that include the locations of all the certified centers in the subregion.

As part of the OPP 7 funding application process, WRCOG must have the participating jurisdiction submit a Letter of Authorization (LOA) to CalRecycle by June 30, 2016. The LOA provides that the jurisdiction is authorizing and empowering WRCOG to execute all documents necessary to secure funds and implement the approved projects for the Program. A template letter (Attachment 1) has been provided to each of the participating jurisdictions.

Used oil events

WRCOG's Used Oil and Oil Filter Exchange events help educate and facilitate the proper recycling of used motor oil and used oil filters in various WRCOG jurisdictions. The primary objective of hosting the events is to educate "Do It Yourself" (DIY) individuals who change their own oil, promoting the recycling of used oil and oil filters; therefore, an auto parts store is a great venue for educating the DIYer. In addition to promoting used oil / oil filter recycling, WRCOG staff informs the DIYer about the County-wide HHW Collection Program in which residents can drop-off other automotive and household hazardous products for free.


On Saturday, May 14, 2016, staff from WRCOG and the City of Riverside hosted a Used Oil and Filter Exchange event at the Auto Zone located at 4195 Van Buren Blvd. KOLA Radio broadcasted remotely from the event. Residents exchanged 112 oil filters that day; 144 collection containers were distributed to attendees. WRCOG also distributed funnels, shop rags, and informational materials describing the proper disposal of used motor oil and filters, in addition to the HHW Collection Program schedule.

On Saturday, June 4, 2016, staff from WRCOG hosted a Used Oil and Filter Exchange event at the O'Reilly's store at 25894 Newport Road in the City of Menifee. KOLA Radio was once again involved, with prepromotion and on-site broadcasting on the day of the event. WRCOG distributed funnels, shop rags and information materials for DIYers. Residents exchanged 44 oil filters and 144 collection containers were distributed to attendees.

The Used Oil Program recently participated in three large regional events and car shows: the Riverside Show and Go in Downtown Riverside on April 23, 2016, the Motte Museum Car Show in Menifee on April 30, 2016, and the Calimesa Street Fair on May 7, 2016. Numerous oil containers along with DIY materials were provided for attendees. Staff gave out DYI materials for oil changes along with program information.

AB 939 Electronic Annual Reports (EAR) Update

The EAR describes the progress a jurisdiction has made in achieving the requirements of the Integrated Waste Management Act (AB 939, Chapter 1095, Statutes of 1989) and the Per Capita Disposal Measurement Act of 2008 (Chapter 343, Statutes of 2008 [Wiggins, SB 1016]). The EAR includes the numbers used to calculate a per capita disposal rate plus all required supporting documentation and attachments of any required documentation to support changes to those numbers. The EAR also includes a status on any planned and/or implemented solid waste diversion programs and facilities. These reports are due on August 3rd of each year.

As part of the WRCOG Solid Waste Cooperative Program, WRCOG staff prepares the EARs for the Cities of Banning, Calimesa, Corona, Hemet, Lake Elsinore, Murrieta, Norco, Perris, San Jacinto, Temecula, and Wildomar. These reports describe the progress a jurisdiction has made in achieving the requirements of AB 939. They include numbers used to calculate a per capita disposal rate plus all required supporting documentation. It also includes a status report on planned and implemented solid waste, diversion programs and facilities, as well as planned or implemented revisions to approved solid waste documents. WRCOG works with local waste haulers in completing these reports. WRCOG staff will begin to reach out to these jurisdictions, as well as waste haulers, to gather the necessary data to complete the EARs on the member's behalf. The data needed for the 2015 EAR include updates on any program changes, disposal and recycling tonnage, events, and materials that the jurisdiction and the waste haulers use to educate the public. Additionally, a new requirement is to provide an update on how the jurisdiction is implementing its organics recycling program, as mandated by Assembly Bill 1826.

Recycling Activities

<u>Multi-Family Housing Outreach</u>: As part of a separate contract with the City of Riverside, WRCOG staff provides additional outreach efforts to multi-family complexes to encourage their participation in recycling programs. Recently, staff has met with managers of six apartment complexes in the City to provide recycling information, including *The Complete Guide to Residential Recycling* booklets. The City of Lake Elsinore Litter Pilot Program
Draft: May 18, 2016

Statement of the Problem

How big of a problem is litter in America? Pretty big, according to Keep America Beautiful (KAB), which estimates that <u>more than 51 billion pieces of litter land on U.S. roadways each year</u> (that is about 6,700 pieces per mile for, those who insist on a breakdown). Why is there so much litter? Consider this: 75 percent of Americans admit they are litterers.

Litter is not only a big problem; it's a costly one as well. KAB estimates that <u>litter clean-up costs</u> run at \$11.5 billion annually in this country. In California, <u>Caltrans alone spent \$52 million of its limited resources on trash pick-up in 2013</u>, collecting enough debris to fill 10,000 garbage trucks (which, if placed end to end would span 50 miles in length). In the Inland Empire, Caltrans spends about \$6 million annually to pick up litter; just look at the amount of trash along our roads at any time and it is clear that \$6 million is not even close to what is needed.

The financial impacts of litter go far beyond the costs of picking it up. The presence of trash in communities affects quality of life, property values and housing prices, and can make prospective businesses think twice about where to locate. Consider these statistics from Keep America Beautiful:

- 93% of homeowners say a littered neighborhood would decrease their assessment of a home's value and influence their decision to purchase a property.
- 40% of homeowners believe that litter reduces home values by up to 24%.
- 36% of business development officials say that litter impacts a decision to locate to a community.
- 55% of realtors think that litter reduces property values by about 9%.
- 60% of property appraisers would reduce a home's value if it was littered.

Concerns about littering are not confined to anti-littering groups. According to <u>a pricing model</u> <u>conducted by the National Association of Home Builders</u>, the presence of litter in a community decreases property values.

Considering the costs of litter clean-up, the negative economic effects that trash has on communities via reduced property values, and potential problems in business attraction, WRCOG and the City of Lake Elsinore are proposing to develop and implement a Pilot Litter Program efforts to address this unsightly problem.

Proposal for a One-Year Pilot Litter Program

Following discussions about a new Litter Initiative with the City of Lake Elsinore, WRCOG has prepared this project summary centered on the development and implementation of a one-year Pilot Program that, if determined to be successful, could eventually expand to other jurisdictions in Western Riverside County as a Regional Litter Initiative. Strategies for reducing litter in local communities are neither complex nor particularly costly – once the net positive impacts related to economic development and quality of life are factored in. The Pilot Program's efforts will be

guided in large part to the findings contained in KAB's "<u>Littering Behavior in America: Results of a National Study</u>." The study provides a comprehensive examination of the issues related to who litters and what steps can be taken to reduce and/or prevent littering.

The Pilot Program proposes to focus on the following implementation components: **community education**, **marketing**, **signage**, **staffing**, **collaboration with outside agencies and funding**. Foremost in this Pilot Program will be an emphasis on developing a positive anti-litter campaign that utilizes education and incentives as ways instill community pride, as opposed to negative approaches that attempt to deter litterers with fines, ticketing, and negative signage. It is hoped that positive efforts will help resolve the problems much faster and for the long term, and set the state for potential regional application. The following is an general outline of the approach that Lake Elsinore and WRCOG staff would follow to achieve goals of making our region a cleaner, more beautiful place to live, work and play. Perhaps most importantly, this Program will work towards injecting a sense of pride and ownership within our communities.

1. Community Education Events and Activities

- School assemblies, litter-focused curriculum and presentations
- "Coffee with the Mayor" or with councilmembers
- Junior High and High School Leadership Programs
- Art contests with elementary school students/Lake Elsinore Valley Chamber of Commerce
- Focused promotion of the City's current bulky item pick up opportunities with CR&R Environmental Services

Marketing

- Program Branding and Signage
- Social Media presence(Facebook, Twitter, Snapchat, Vine, Vimeo,
- Magazines and other print media (Chamber of Commerce, assembly and senate newsletters, fillers on billing materials, etc.
- Radio and cable spots
- Press Releases on upcoming events
- Good citizen stories
- Incentives from sponsors to be provided at community clean up events, etc.
- Billboards
- Storm

3. Signage

- Adopt A Highway sponsorship
- Design signage (possibly Crowdsource it) for citywide use as determined by City.
- Additional signs / banners to advertise and promote upcoming clean up events
- "On location" banners during clean up events

4. Staffing

WRCOG staff, City of Lake Elsinore staff, community volunteers, LEUSD school district coordinator, and student volunteers

5. Collaboration with Outside Agencies

Waste haulers may already have requirements within their city contracts involving clean-up programs. There may be some that include litter abatement which could be worked into community Clean-up Programs. In addition, waste haulers may be able to provide some staffing for Community Clean-ups.

Potential provision of additional receptacles

Waste haulers and other agencies such as water districts or energy companies could be asked to be involved in other areas as well, including sponsoring certain aspects of the program in turn for advertising and promotion opportunities in their communities.

6. Receptacles

- Identify areas where additional receptacles are needed
- Work with RTA
- Seek funding through grants, sponsor donations, local hauler for purchases
- Test "receptacle sensors" to see if city efficiencies can be improved

7. Funding

WRCOG could offer funding and/or staff support with approval by the Executive Committee to support the activities listed above.

Next Steps

- Review with City of Lake Elsinore staff, refine and make assignments
- Develop budget , timeframe and deliverables
- Seek input /direction/ approval from Lake Elsinore Council and WRCOG Executive Committee
