Summary:

The Used Oil Program provides 15 participating member agencies with educational and outreach opportunities for their residents to properly recycle used motor oil and to exchange used oil filters for up to two new ones under \$15.00 each. The Program is funded by a grant from CalRecycle on a per capita distribution. Staff works with a marketing consultant to schedule oil filter collection events at certified used oil collection centers for the filter exchanges. Staff also provides used oil collection containers to member agencies at their request. This Program helps member agencies obtain compliance with Assembly Bill 939 as it relates to hazardous waste source reduction.

Purpose / WRCOG 2022-2027 Strategic Plan Goal:

The purpose of this item is to provide an update of the current Environmental Department activities. This effort aligns with WRCOG's 2022-2027 Strategic Plan Goal #6 (Develop and implement programs that support resilience for our region) and sub-goal 6.3 (Continuing to support the solid waste and recycling program).

Discussion:

Background

WRCOG continues to engage the public with its digital campaigns to educate the public on where to properly recycle their used oil and exchange used oil filters for up to two free new ones. Members of the public participate via Facebook by clicking on advertisement that opens an online survey. Upon completion of the survey, participants receive a voucher that provides the date, time, and instructions for participation, and is valid for a free oil filter exchange. Exchanges are available on Saturdays from the time a Certified Collection Center (CCC) auto parts store opens until 5:00 p.m. Staff corresponds with each CCC auto parts store before events, confirming safety measures and procedures are in place. Additional efforts to increase attendance for used oil filter collection events are currently under review.

Existing Situation

During Fiscal Year (FY) 2023/2024, staff provided used oil containers to the City of Lake Elsinore for its Car & Truck Show on September 30, 2023. Staff attended the City of Corona's Household Hazardous Waste event on October 14, 2023, and provided 300 used oil containers to attendees.

For the Used Oil / Filter Exchange Program, for FY 2023/2024 there were 569 used oil filters exchanged for new ones. To date, there has been 1,129 participants that completed the surveys on used motor oil and filters. To date, online impressions tracked at 356,599 (the number of times an event ad was seen at least once on a viewers page). The following events have been held and are scheduled until end of 2023. Scheduling for the end of FY 2023/2024 will be completed by the beginning of December.

Summary:

The Love Your Neighborhood (LYN) Program is an "action-ready" stormwater pollution prevention initiative that aims to increase pollution awareness and its impact on the environment. The Program is funded through a partnership with the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District. The Program also helps obtain real-time data to track the number of pollutants removed from communities in support of stormwater mandates required by state permits. The LYN Program provides member agencies with resources to initiate their own community clean-up activities or for individual residents to perform neighborhood clean-ups. The Program has the flexibility to meet different needs to address pollution prevention and mitigation. WRCOG staff provides assistance to develop events, assist in tracking the tonnage of the materials removed, and record the information on the LYN website.

Purpose / WRCOG 2022-2027 Strategic Plan Goal:

The purpose of this item is to provide an update of current and future Love Your Neighborhood activities in the WRCOG subregion of western Riverside County. This effort aligns with WRCOG's 2022-2027 Strategic Plan Goal #4 (Communicate proactively about the role and activities of the Council of Governments).

Discussion:

Background

The waste diversion goals set by California under legislation (AB 939, AB 341, AB 1826, AB 827, and SB 1383) require local jurisdictions to implement techniques that promote resident and business recycling and organic recycling. To regionally address these measures, WRCOG formed the Solid Waste Committee (SWC), comprised of participating WRCOG member agencies.

The Love Your Neighborhood (LYN) Program was brought to WRCOG as a collaborative effort from the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District. The Program supports marketing and awareness on illegal disposal and littering, using online platforms. Program goals include quantifiable results tracking litter removal, increased pollution prevention, meeting objectives with the MS4 Permits,

and complying with California mandates related to solid waste, recycling, and household hazardous waste, which aligns with WRCOG's Energy & Environmental Department programs. The Program was extended for three years through June 2027 with funding from the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District. The Program receives \$50,000 each year to administer the Program throughout the subregion of western Riverside County and to support efforts in the eastern section of Riverside County in collaboration with the Coachella Valley Association Governments and its member cities. Funding helps to provide materials for communities to complete successful clean up events, organized by the City or by members of the community.

Present Situation

Staff has developed projects and worked with member agencies to hold LYN events. Since April 2023 there have been five events held in the Cities of Corona, Hemet, Menifee, Murrieta, and Perris, with an upcoming event in November in Riverside County first supervisorial district. Staff, in conjunction with the City of Corona, are launching a *Clean Up Kit* for residents to use in their city to for individual or DIY clean up events. The kit includes trash pickers, gloves, bags, and a safety vest. Staff encourages all member agencies to participate in the Program, as it is no-cost, and staff is open to collaboration to develop Program specifics with each city or service organization. The kit sign-up form will be online via the City of Corona's webpage and a link will be placed on the WRCOG website. Staff has also submitted a speaker abstract-proposal on this program to the Solid Waste Association of North America conference to be held in 2024. Staff is awaiting their decision.

Summary:

ReCollect is an educational tool that can be used to help residents and businesses properly dispose of solid waste. The ReCollect icon / widget is placed on a participating member agency's webpage or accessed as an app on a smartphone. ReCollect is offered at no cost to member agencies that participate in WRCOG's Solid Waste Committee. WRCOG's goals for using ReCollect are to 1) lower calls to city staff and direct questions to the contracted waste hauler, 2) provide valuable analytical data on which solid waste materials need more attention in the region, and 3) raise the waste diversion number from landfills in the region.

Purpose / WRCOG 2022-2027 Strategic Plan Goal:

The purpose of this item is to provide an update of the current ReCollect activities. This effort aligns WRCOG's 2022-2027 Strategic Plan Goal #4 (Communicate proactively about the role and activities of the Council of Governments) and Goal #6.3 (Continuing to support the Solid Waste & Recycling Program).

<u>Discussion</u>: <u>Background</u>

The waste diversion goals set by the State of California under legislation (AB 939, AB 341, AB 1826, AB 827, and SB 1383) require local jurisdictions to implement techniques that promote resident and business recycling, as well as organic recycling. To regionally address these measures, WRCOG formed the Solid Waste Committee (SWC), comprised of participating WRCOG member agencies.

WRCOG provides member agencies a subscription account for a waste and recycling communication platform, known as ReCollect. The ReCollect toolbar has three components: the Collection Calendar, Waste Wizard, and Waste Sorting Game. The Collection Calendar provides the public with information on which dates to take out the trash, recycle, and organic bins based on the input address. The Waste Wizard is a search engine that provides a list of locations on where to dispose of waste based on the

imputed material. The Waste Sorting Game is an easy drag and drop game to determine which materials are to be placed in which bin or taken to a local facility. ReCollect provides a "widget" (a simple line of code) so it can be added to websites or web pages, making it easy for residents to find and use.

Present Situation

ReCollect's Collection Calendar, Waste Sorting Game, and Waste Wizard widget are being used by residents in the Cities of Hemet and Moreno Valley. Between July 2023 and September 2023, there were over 1,297 material views under the Waste Wizard widget, 302 new addresses were searched for in the Collection Calendars, and 438 reminders were sent. ReCollect's mobile app had six mobile installs and accumulated 83 app user sessions. The sorting game included in ReCollect's widget has garnered nine game plays.

Because of staffing changes at various member agencies, WRCOG is providing updated information including a tutorial of how the ReCollect tool works.

Summary:

The Regional Food Rescue Program (RFRP) is a partnership between WRCOG and the Cities of Jurupa Valley, Moreno Valley, Murrieta, Perris, and San Jacinto. One task of the RFRP includes developing implementation plans to identify Tier 1 and Tier 2 edible food waste generators within those participating cities and determining food rescue organizations that would receive food from those generators.

Currently, the consultants are working with their subcontractor to develop educational and outreach materials with feedback from WRCOG and member agency staff. These items will be provided during the project to those identified generators, and made available broadly to the public via social media. Inspections commenced in October and will run through the end of December.

Purpose / WRCOG 2022-2027 Strategic Plan Goal:

The purpose of this item is to provide an update of the Regional Food Rescue Program activities. This effort aligns with WRCOG's 2022-2027 Strategic Plan Goal #6 (Develop and implement programs that support resilience for our region) and sub-goal, 6.3 (Continuing to support the solid waste and recycling program).

Discussion:

The waste diversion goals set by California under legislation (AB 939, AB 341, AB 1826, AB 827, and SB 1383) require local jurisdictions to implement techniques that promote resident and business recycling, and organic recycling. To regionally address these measures, WRCOG formed the Solid Waste Committee (SWC), comprised of participating WRCOG member agencies.

Background

SB 1383 is a 'short-lived climate pollutant' bill that addresses reducing organic waste disposal by 75%, and rescuing at least 20% of currently disposed surplus food by the year 2025. Organic waste in landfills emits 20% of the State's methane. SB 1383 outlines specific mandatory requirements for local jurisdictions to undertake to meet these goals. Jurisdictions that fail to comply with SB 1383

requirements could be subject to financial penalties.

WRCOG has been updating its member agencies regarding SB 1383 in a variety of means, including regular meetings of its Solid Waste Committee and other Committees. In addition, WRCOG issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for a consultant to provide a scope of work and associated costs for an edible food rescue program. The selected proposer, MSW, is working on the following areas.

- Project management team coordination
- Capacity and compliance food recovery agencies, Tier 1 & Tier 2 edible food waste compliance
- Public outreach communication & education plan, research, surveys, audience mapping, media audit
- Implementation of outreach and education plan
- Inspection schedule and plan Tier 1 & Tier 2
- Regional food recovery plan Careit mobile application database, written plan
- Final Report

Five cities are participating in this project, which include the Cities of Jurupa Valley, Moreno Valley, Murrieta, Perris, and San Jacinto. The total cost is \$299,845 for the first year. The agreement term for this project is three years from the date of execution with the option of two, one-year extensions. The agreement includes a "not to exceed" clause and is specific to task orders for each participating city, whereby work cannot commence until approved and ordered by WRCOG. Each task order will identify which tasks in the scope will be performed by MSW for each city. The WRCOG administrative fee for each agreement with participating cities is 7.5% of the total for each city, which WRCOG will bill accordingly.

Present Situation

The contractor, MSW, and their subcontractors, DeGrave Communications and Mariposa Eco Consulting, have been working together to develop an implementation plan to begin inspections of Tier 1 and Tier 2 edible food generators in addition to food rescue organizations and food service organizations. Inspections will commence after participating agencies approve and review outreach materials.

The implementation plans identified the edible food waste generators, developing education and outreach pieces, setting up meetings with the participating cities, developing marketing and collateral pieces to ensure proper education of Tier 1 and Tier 2 generators, and ultimately scheduling inspections to occur in the months of October through December 31. Staff has been working with the contractors to review materials, meet with participating cities, provide feedback, and work with CalRecycle on approvals and direction.

MSW has been meeting with WRCOG's member agencies regarding the inspection schedule and will make any necessary adjustments to outreach documents or informational letters based upon specific jurisdictional needs. The next phase will be to develop a complaint system as prescribed by SB1383 and provide that to the participating member agencies as part of the scope of services.

Prior Action(s):

August 16, 2023: The Solid Waste Committee received and filed.

Financial Summary:

Activities related to the Food Rescue and Technical Assistance initiatives are not currently included in the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 budget; however, a budget amendment will be brought forward to amend the budget accordingly. This is primarily due to the fact that agreements with participating agencies were not fully executed at the time of the budget being adopted. These activities will be budgeted under the Solid Waste Program (1038) in the General Fund (110).
